

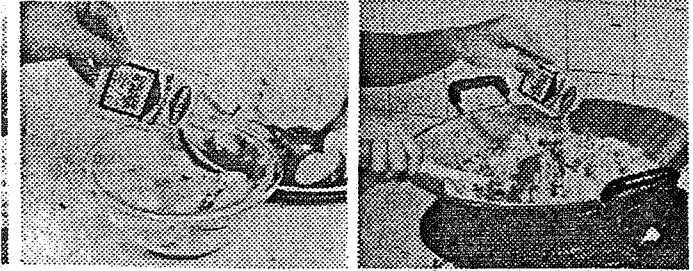

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Datuk Sir Clough dies after heart attack



KUALA LUMPUR, Fri. — A prominent leader of the Malaysian Ceylonese community, Datuk Sir Clough Thuraisingham (above), died of a heart attack in his Jalan Bukit Travers home here early today. He was 80.

He will be cremated at the Jalan Loke Yew crematorium tomorrow afternoon.

The cortege is expected to leave the house at 3.30 p.m.

He leaves a wife, three sons, four daughters and several grandchildren.

His eldest son Mr. T. Balen, 36, said: "He woke up early this morning, had a cup of coffee and chatted with my mother and then he suddenly collapsed at 2.50 a.m."

On Tuesday, Datuk Sir Clough met his grandson and told his wife that he was happy to have met all the members of his family.

Born in Talping, Datuk Sir Clough was educated in St. Thomas College, Colombo, and in Cambridge. He graduated in 1923 and was called to the Bar in Middle Temple.

He was made a Datuk by the Johore Sultan in 1949 and was conferred an honorary Doctor of Law degree by the University of Singapore in 1953.

Knighthood

In June 1955, he received his knighthood from the British Queen and five years later, he was made a Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the Empire.

A former member for Education in the then Federal Legislative Council, he was always in the thick of politics and was one of the founders — with the late Sir Onn bin Jaafar — of the Independence of Malaya Party.

Agreement on sea link and satellite lease signed

JAKARTA, Fri. — Malaysia and Indonesia today signed a memorandum of understanding for the construction of the submarine link between Medan and Penang and the leasing of the Palapa satellite system for Malaysia's internal communications network.

The memorandum was signed by the Energy, Telecommunications and Posts Minister, Mr Leo Moggie, on behalf of Malaysia, while Indonesian Minister Air Marshal Roesmin Nuryadin signed for his country.

The signing of the memorandum is the follow-up to the decisions reached by President

Suharto and President Onn at the Jogjakarta meeting last month.

Mr Moggie said the two projects towards the realization of communications links between the two countries.

On behalf of Malaysia, he thanked Indonesia for offering its Palapa satellite facilities to Malaysia's communications network.

Three major labour laws to be reviewed

KUANTAN, Fri. — Three major labour laws, the Employment Ordinance, the Trade Union Ordinance and the Industrial Relations Act are under review by the Government.

Labour and Manpower Minister Datuk Richard Ho said the review is being made in order to examine whether their provisions adequately protect the public interest and those of the employers and workers.

He said: "It is not possible now to reveal the nature of any amendments that may have to be made to these laws, but with recent develop-

ment here said the labour force has increased from 4.1 million to 5.1 million.

He said that most of them were wage earners within the services sector which is a direct effect of the Ministry.

The Minister said the Government's policy on the hundred thousand Indonesian workers on the Felda scheme is being reviewed.

"This is an important policy and the Ministry of Labour is reviewing it."
